Royal Commission Recommendation 15.2 – Inclusion of primary care in disaster management: Australian, state and territory governments should develop arrangements that facilitate greater inclusion of primary healthcare providers in disaster management, including representation on relevant disaster committees and plans and providing training, and education and other supports.

The Commonwealth Government supports in principle this recommendation: The Commonwealth

Government will enhance the role of Primary Health Networks in local disaster response, in particular through engagement with state and local emergency response coordination mechanisms

- 11.10am Session 2 Theme: Advancing Community Resilience

A reflection on the process and direction of community resilience in the emergency and disaster setting, as we mark 10 years since the release of the influential COAG National Strategy for Disaster Resilience, in February 2011. Resilience 10 years on - Was the NSDR the Holy Grail it promised to be? What are the implications of the Final Report of last year's Royal Commission for community resilience? How do we advance community resilience?

<u>Royal Commission Recommendation</u> 3.5 – Establishing a standing resilience and recovery entity: *The Australian Government should establish a standing entity that will enhance natural disaster resilience and recovery, focused on long-term disaster risk reduction.* 

The Commonwealth Government supports this recommendation and welcomes the finding of the Royal Commission: The Commonwealth will establish a national resilience, relief and recovery agency to commence operations no later than 1 July 2021. This new agency will coordinate and align Australia's national capability to build resilience, better prepare for natural disasters, and recover from all hazards.
