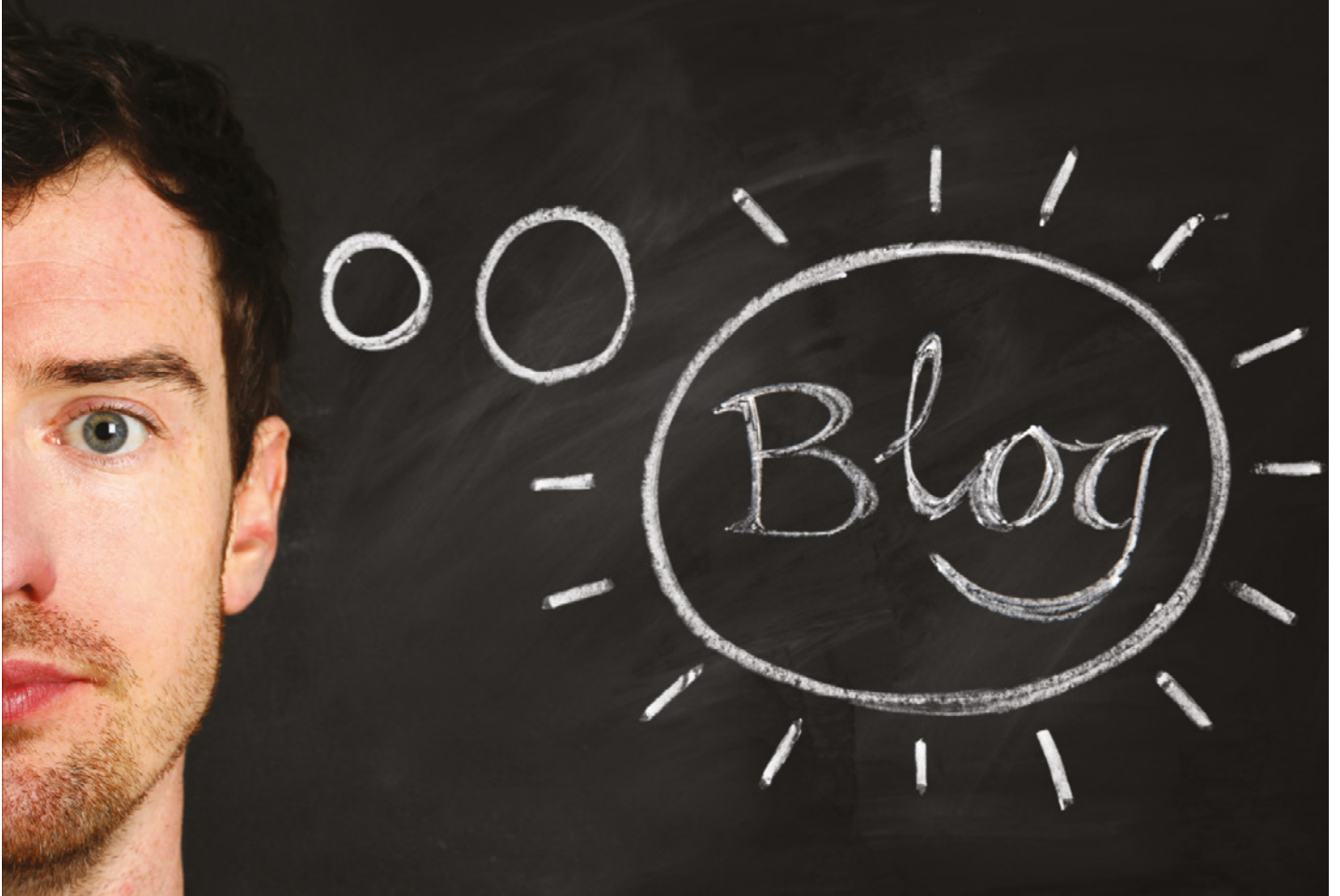

Allocate+

Allocate+ is the online system Monash students use to allocate themselves into lectures and tutorials for on-campus units.

After enrolling in WES, you are required to check your units in Allocate+ and create your personal timetable. If a lecture or tutorial is full you must select another time option, or another unit if necessary.

Access Allocate+ on: **allocate.timetable.monash.edu**

Enter your **Authcate username** and **password**.

Once logged in, you will see your enrolled units listed on the left-hand side of the screen. You will only need to allocate the Semester 1 2015 units at this stage. Click on each unit and enter your lecture and/or tutorial allocations.

When you have finished, click on **My Allocations** button to view your allocations.

When complete, click **Logout** and exit the browser. This is particularly important if you are in a computer lab on campus.

Note: Some lecture and tutorial times may change during the adjustment period. You will be notified of any variations.

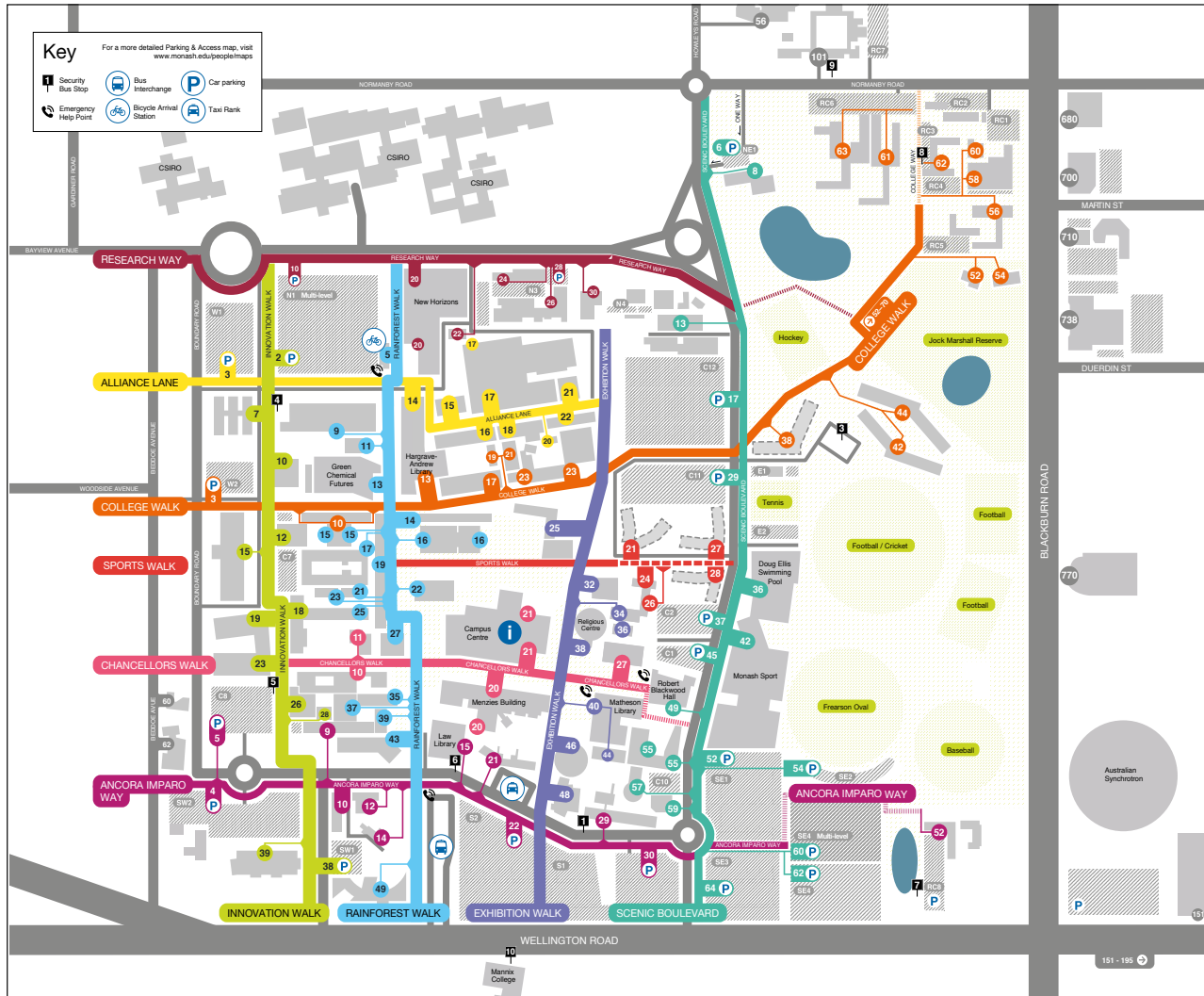
