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## JACK McDONELL - TEN YEARS A WARDEN

Nearly 200 people attended a farewell dinner for the retiring warden of Deakin Hall and executive warden of the North-East Halls, Dr. Jack McDonell and Mrs. McDonell, at the Halls last Thursday night.

Dr. McDonell has been warden of Deakin, the first of the Monash halls, since its opening in March 1962, and executive warden of the North-East Halls since the creation of that position in April, 1964. He has also held a part-time position in the department of physics. Both he and Mrs. McDonell have played a major role in the successful implementation of the University's student housing policies which in many ways have been in the forefront of such enterprises in Australia.

Among the guests at the farewell dinner were the wardens, masters and principals of the Melbourne University Colleges and representatives from La Trobe University.

The Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Matheson, in paying tribute to the work of Dr. and Mrs. McDonell, said that while the Monash halls differed from colleges in many ways, they were more than just places to eat, sleep and to do one's study.

"Their future depends upon their ability to show that they have something to offer - a stimulating experience that students will neither regret nor forget," he said.

Dr. McDonell leaves next week on eight months' study leave. He will return to a full-time research appointment in the department of physics.

## STUDENTS GET THE CREDIT

The State Government has acknowledged the work of Monash law students in shaping recently-introduced legislation aimed at curbing "crazy auctions". The Minister for Labor and Industry, Mr. Rafferty, introduced the Bill in Parliament on November 2.

Commenting on the legislation, an editorial in The Age said that the Monash students had "conducted public-service protests, picketing shops, warning potential buyers and drawing up a detailed report calling for legislation banning the sales. Mr. Rafferty.....acknowledged the role of the students and, in a welcome example of co-operation between campus and Government, said that their in-depth investigation has influenced legislative action."

## MR. G. W. WILDMAN IS NEW BUILDINGS OFFICER

Mr. Geoff Wildman has been appointed the University's Buildings Officer in succession to Mr. George Boycott, who retired in September.

Mr. Wildman, a professional engineer, has been Works Officer, directing the technical side of the Buildings Branch operation, since early 1965.

## ENTRANCED WITH JAVA

Dr. Margaret Kartomi, senior lecturer in music, will give a public lecture next week on trance music and drama in Java.

The lecture, presented by the Australian Indonesian Association of Victoria, will be in R6 at 8 p.m. on Friday, November 17. It will be accompanied by tapes and slides and will feature a live Javanese dance performance by Miss Niken Arumdati, a student from Jogjakarta.

Dr. Kartomi has travelled widely in Indonesia and Malaysia. She was responsible for bringing the gamelan (Indonesian orchestra) to Monash.



## SCHOLARSHIPS FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF JAPANESE

Two postgraduate students in the Monash department of Japanese have been awarded the Saionji-Hammersley Scholarship, the most prestigious award for Japanese studies in Australia.

Miss Valerie McGown, who received the award for 1972, left for Tokyo on October 17 to study the problems of labour relations in contemporary Japan. Mr. Marc Brunet has won the scholarship for 1973 and will leave for Tokyo early next year to collect data for his thesis on the system of address in the contemporary Japanese language.

Facilities for study and supervision in Japan for these students will be provided by the Monash Japanese Centre in Tokyo in co-operation with the University of Tokyo and the National Language Research Institute.

## JOB HELP FOR GRADUATES

Within the next few weeks many graduating students will be seeking suitable jobs, and some may lack confidence in their approaches to potential employers. To help such people, the Careers and Appointments Office proposes to arrange a series of group discussions for job-seekers. In an informal atmosphere, over a cup of coffee, participants will be able to discuss with each other, with careers counsellors - and, occasionally, visiting authorities - methods of finding out about suitable jobs, plans of attack and techniques of presenting oneself to employers.

These 'Coffee Groups' will be held on Wednesday and Friday afternoons between 3 p.m. and 4.30 p.m., beginning on Wednesday, November 22. They will be so structured that a person may participate in one each week (or both if he wishes) for as long as he or she feels that there is something to be gained from them.

## RUPERT MURDOCH TO SPEAK AT MELBOURNE

Mr. Rupert Murdoch will deliver the Arthur Norman Smith Memorial Lecture for 1972 at the University of Melbourne on Wednesday, November 15. His subject will be: "Newspaper Publishing in the '70s".

Mr. Murdoch is chairman of News of the World Organisation Ltd., London, and managing director of News Ltd., publishers of "The Australian".

The lecture will begin in the public Lecture Theatre, Old Arts Building, at 8.30 p.m. It is free and open to the public.

## CAMPUS TELEPHONES: THE FACTS

It is apparent that there have been widespread misconceptions about the PMG-type multi-coin telephones previously located within University buildings. These units were NOT operated by the PMG, but were rented to the University in the same manner as the present Victa Red Telephones.

The aim of the University is to break-even on this operation, but experience in 1971 showed that the University's operation of the PMG public telephones was becoming uneconomic - that is, income from calls did not cover the cost of rentals and calls.

To rectify the situation, it became necessary to introduce the Victa Red type telephones, which provide for local calls only at a charge of 7c per call.

Trunk line calls cannot be made on the Victa phones, but the Post Office has now agreed to install and maintain seven PMG public telephones outside buildings on campus from which trunk calls can be made.

Once these PMG public telephones are installed, the existing PMG public telephones located within the Union building will be replaced with Victa Red telephones.
