A LONGER BREAK THIS CHRISTMAS

The University Council has agreed that staff be granted an additional three days' leave in conjunction with the Christmas-New Year holidays.

Approval was given on the basis that, if at some future time staff are granted additional annual leave, the length of the Christmas-New Year close-down will be reviewed with a view to reverting to arrangements that have existed in the past few years.

The University will close down this year at 5 p.m. on Friday, December 22, 1972, and will resume on the morning of Monday, January 8, 1973.

If any staff are required to work during the close-down period, they will be compensated in accordance with the relevant awards or determinations covering their employment. In the absence of any such awards and determinations, they will be credited for each day worked with an additional day's recreation leave to be taken in accordance with the normal conditions of recreation leave.

DEAKIN HALL WARDEN: APPLICATIONS INVITED

Applications are invited for the position of warden of Deakin Hall. The appointment will be for a period of three years initially, and is open to any present male or female member of the University staff, or to persons who have accepted appointments which they will take up early in 1973.

The appointee's career prospects will remain with his initial University position, but he will be expected to devote some of his time to the Hall.

The warden will be responsible to the University Council through the Vice-Chancellor for all aspects of the running of Deakin Hall, apart from those administrative functions which are within the province of the chairman of the committee of wardens. In particular, he will be responsible for the maintenance of a suitable climate in Deakin Hall, having regard to the individual and group needs of students.

Further information may be obtained from the Staff Branch and applicants are also invited to get in touch with Dr. J. R. Lawry, warden of Roberts Hall, or Mrs. B. L. Cumming, warden of Howitt Hall, to discuss any details of the position.

Application should be made by letter, addressed to the Staff Administration Officer, and be received by December 1, 1972.

(Mrs B. L. Cumming has been appointed acting executive warden of the North-East Halls until December 31, 1972, and Dr F.Ng has been appointed acting warden of Deakin Hall.)
