

Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing – 2026/2027 Key Dates and FAQs

The following document summarises some Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) about the Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who is eligible to enrol in this program?

The Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing will be offered to generally registered pharmacists (no conditions) with Ahpra. You will be required to submit proof of current Ahpra registration on application to the course.

Are pharmacy students or interns eligible to enrol in this program?

No. The course is only available to generally registered pharmacists with Ahpra (no conditions).

How is the course structured?

The course comprises of four individual components:

Two microcredentials

Pharmacist Prescribing: Clinical Conditions 1 (PMC5005)	Pharmacist Prescribing: Clinical Conditions 2 (PMC5006)
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Microcredentials are essentially short, assessed programs of study that can be credited towards a university qualification. The two microcredentials in this course each comprise of approximately 100 hours of learning, and each contribute 6 credit points to the Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing. They can be completed in any order. These microcredentials are hosted on an online Learning Management System called Guroo Learning.

Two traditional units of study

Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 1 (PGC5301)	Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2 (PGC5302)
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Traditional units of study are delivered over a 12-week University teaching period. Each unit comprises approximately 144 hours of learning. These units can be completed prior to or after the completion of the microcredentials. Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 1 is a prerequisite of Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2. These units are hosted on the Monash online Learning Management System called Moodle.

How do I apply to enrol in the course and the units/microcredentials?

You can lodge an application for the Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing [here](#).

If successful, you will receive an offer of a place in the course. You must accept your offer and enrol into the units Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 1 (PGC5301) and Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2 (PGC5302) by the offer lapse date. Upon successful enrolment, you will also be provided further instructions about how to apply for the Pharmacist Prescribing: Clinical Conditions 1 (PMC5005) and Pharmacist Prescribing: Clinical Conditions 2 (PMC5006) microcredentials.

How long does the program take?

The course can be completed in one year part-time or completed across two years.

How is the course taught?

We use an active learning style approach to teaching within this course. You will be required to complete a series of self-directed online learning modules prior to applying your learning to the management of fictitious cases in facilitated hands-on online workshops. Where we need to teach physical examination skills this will be taught during in-person workshops at a Melbourne based Monash University campus.

The Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2 unit requires you to complete workplace-based assessments under supervision of a prescriber in a work-integrated learning environment.

How will I be assessed in this course?

We ultimately want to ensure that you are competent to prescribe medications within your personal and professional scope of practice as a pharmacist prescribing. We use a series of assessments using fictitious and real cases. This includes Objective Structured Clinical Examinations (OSCEs), a type of oral examination whereby you are assessed on your ability to conduct a patient consultation and make prescribing decisions for fictitious cases.

You will be assessed using the competency grading scheme (Pass/Fail grade). All assessments are hurdles; you must successfully complete all assessments to pass the units and progress within the course. You will be provided at least TWO attempts at each assessment and will be provided feedback after each assessment. You will also be offered remediation help from the teaching team in the event that you do not pass an assessment on your first attempt. Further details about each assessment can be found in our Learner Guide or in the individual Unit handbooks/microcredential summaries.

What are the work-integrated learning (WIL) supervised practice requirements for this course?

In the Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2 unit, you are required to be supervised by an Ahpra registered health professional who is currently a prescriber and has at least 12 months experience as a prescriber in an area of practice relevant to your learning needs as a prescriber in training. At this stage, this Designated Prescriber (DP) cannot be a pharmacist prescriber as they are unlikely to have sufficient experience to supervise you in a manner that will best support your development. Examples of eligible DPs include nurse-practitioners and medical practitioners.

Your DP must formally agree to provide supervision, mentorship and assess your prescribing competency in a WIL environment. In this agreement form, you will explain how the DP selected will support your learning needs for the WIL component of this course. You are required to arrange the DP to support your learning needs.

We strongly encourage that you start arranging your DP as soon as you enrol in the Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing. Submission of a signed agreement from your DP must be completed by **the end of week 1** within the Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2 unit. This is considered a component of the WIL Prescribing Portfolio assessment hurdle for this unit. This is to ensure that you are prepared for the WIL components of this unit.

You will be required to submit the following so that a DP can be approved by the teaching team:

- A copy of the DPs Ahpra registration
- An up-to-date CV for the DP confirming their experience as a prescriber (12 months experience as a prescriber)
- A signed copy of the Pharmacist Prescribing WIL agreement form. In this form:
 - You will explain how the DP will support your learning needs
 - You and your DP will indicate any perceived or actual conflicts of interest (e.g. personal relationship)

The teaching team must review and approve all DPs.

Further detail about the WIL components of the course are included in the Learner Guide (available on request). As a summary, there are three milestones within the Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2 unit. By each milestone, you are required to have completed a series of workplace-based assessments under the supervision of your DP. This allows the DP to assess your ability to demonstrate key prescribing processes. Progression at each milestone will depend on your demonstrated competency. We anticipate that this will require at least six days of direct observation spaced evenly across a 12-week semester (2 days prior to each milestone) but may require longer depending on your demonstrated competency.

You may incur additional travel costs related to completing work-integrated learning components under the supervision of your DP.

DPs will be provided with instructional material and standardised marking rubrics for all WIL assessments and will be trained by the teaching team so that they are prepared to provide effective clinical supervision, workplace-based assessment, and feedback.

Is this course accredited by the Australian Pharmacy Council?

The traditional units of this course (Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 1 and 2) are accredited with conditions by the Australian Pharmacy Council. The assessments in these units are mapped to the performance outcomes framework for Pharmacist Prescribing Education Programs of the Australian Pharmacy Council.

Is there a Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) pathway for this course?

Given the unique structure of this course, it is unlikely that learners will be eligible for RPL. Learner applications for RPL will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Can pharmacists that do not reside in Victoria apply for and enrol into the course?

Yes. However, learners need to be mindful that there are compulsory in-person workshops and assessments in this course that are only delivered at Monash University campuses in Melbourne.

Can I pay in instalments/is there a payment plan option?

Eligible learners may apply for [FEE-HELP](#) for traditional units of study only. There is no payment plan or loan option for the microcredential components of the course.

What funding is available to support completion of this course?

We are aware of some subsidies for our program being offered by pharmacy professional bodies and employers and encourage you to check with your member bodies and/or employers on what financial assistance they may be able to provide.

What is the refund policy?

There is a separate refund policy for microcredentials and traditional units.

For the microcredentials:

If a learner does not abide by the conditions of the microcredential, the team reserves the right to cancel the participant's registration at any time and without a full refund of fees.

If the team decides to cancel the microcredential, learners are entitled to a full refund of fees

Learners can apply in writing to withdraw from a microcredential and obtain a refund:

- A full refund (100%) will be provided if you apply to withdraw at least 28 calendar days prior to the commencement date.
- A 50% refund will be provided if you apply to withdraw at least 14 calendar days prior to the commencement date.
- No refund will be provided if you apply to withdraw later than 14 calendar days prior to the commencement date.
- Note: in the event of late withdrawal, you may credit your registration fee to another date (same course) within two years of your original registration.

Traditional units

What post-nominals can I use after successfully completing this course?

After successfully completing all components of this course you will be awarded the post-nominals GradCertPharmPresc by Monash University.

What will I be allowed to prescribe following the completion of this course?

This course focuses on core prescribing principles and processes to ensure you meet the prescribing performance outcomes of APC. It will also teach you about the diagnosis and management of specific primary care conditions.

Can I access the Monash University library and other student resources?

If you enrol in the Graduate Certificate of Pharmacist Prescribing and are enrolled in a traditional unit of study you will be considered a Monash University student and therefore can access a range of resources including the Monash University library.

It is important to note that if you are enrolled in a microcredential alone, you are not considered a student at Monash University and do not have student access to facilities and services, including Monash ID, Monash IT account, Library or learning resources that are licensed for enrolled students only.

What equipment do I need for this course?

To engage in the physical examinations workshops of Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 1, learners will be required to purchase the following equipment:

- A penlight torch (Approximately \$3)
- A Littmann Classic III stethoscope (Approximately \$170)
- An otoscope (Approximately \$160)

What are the in-person requirements of this course?

Learners are required to attend the following in-person workshops/assessments at one of the Monash University Melbourne campuses (exact location to be confirmed):

- A five-day intensive series of physical examination skill workshops and assessments including OSCEs (relevant to Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 1)
- A half-day morning oral health risk assessment workshop (relevant to Pharmacist Prescribing: Clinical Conditions 1)
- A half-day afternoon wound care/musculoskeletal assessment workshop (relevant to Pharmacist Prescribing: Clinical Conditions 2)
- An in-person OSCE (relevant to Pharmacist Prescribing Skills 2) – learners will be provided assessment time slot options but must be available from 9am-5:30pm on the day selected

Cost of travel and other associated expenses for attendance at compulsory in-person workshops and assessments will vary depending on personal circumstances and requirements.
