RULES FOR THE ROSENGARTEN PRIZE

1. The work to be presented must have been performed during the resident/registrar's tenure at the Alfred and if a clinical study is being presented it should involve primarily Alfred patients. It is acknowledged that clinical trials may recruit patients from databases outside the Alfred but in the spirit of the Rosengarten prize, patients should be primarily recruited from within the Alfred system.
2. Although clinical and basic sciences studies invariably require additional expertise, the study should predominantly be the work of the presenting resident/registrar.
3. The competition is open to residents and registrars of the Alfred system. It is not open to medical students.
4. The presenting resident/registrar must deport himself or herself as though the presentation is at an international meeting. The resident/registrar should be dressed appropriately for an international meeting and begin by acknowledging the Chairman and the audience. It is not necessary for the presenter to introduce him or herself as this will be done by the Chairman.
5. The first slide is the title slide
6. The second slide should indicate the contribution of the presenter to the work and should indicate any conflicts of interest
7. The presenter will have 10 mins for the presentation and there will be 5 mins of questions.
8. Abstract text length: maximum of 1,950 characters, including spaces. Title, authors, tables and images will not be counted.

Single space only

All abstracts must be structured using the following section headings:

- Background and aims
- methods
- results
- conclusions
