ARGC GRANTS ANNOUNCED

Monash staff have received a total of \$560,487 in the Australian Research Grants Committee 1973 awards announced last week. Seventy-five grants were made to Monash, including 21 for new projects.

The following is a list of awards over \$13,000. A full list will be published in November issue of Monash Reporter.

New projects:

Physical sciences: Professor R. Van der Borght – Finite amplitude convection in a compressible fluid and its application to astronomical problems, \$15,061.

Humanities and social sciences: Professor M.I. Logan and Professor M.G. Swift — Policy implications of population migration in West Malaysia, \$16,750.

Biological sciences: Professor R. Porter Factors involved in the dynamic control of movement, \$27,026.

Chemical sciences: Professor R.D. Brown and Dr. Peter Godfrey – Molecules in space, \$42,133.

Continuing projects:

Physical sciences: Professor R. Street, Dr. J.D. Cashion and Dr. J.A. Barclay — Studies of solids at low temperatures in high magnetic fields, \$33,808.

Mr. G.J. Troup and Dr. J.R. Pilbrow — Electron spin resonance, nuclear magnetic resonance and anti-ferro magnetic resonance in compounds and crystals, \$13,500.

Professor B.R. Morton - Dynamics of convective clouds, \$13,088.

Chemical sciences: Professor R.D. Brown and Dr. F.R. Burden — The study of short-lived molecular species by microwave spectroscopy, \$13,255.

Biological sciences: Dr. R.F. Mark — The function of regenerated synpatic connections in the nervous system, \$13,352.

WORKSHOP ON TEACHING IN PAEDIATRICS

Staff members from the faculty of education and the department of paediatrics, Queen Victoria Hospital, will collaborate in a workshop on paediatrics teaching next month.

The workshop will be held in the education building on November 4-5. Its aims to bring together people concerned with or about the teaching of paediatrics and with the results of that teaching; and to work through a project of practical value to the participants.

Dr. Maurice Balson, senior lecturer in education, will introduce several of the topics, which include "The preparation of education objectives", "Selection of instructional methods" and "Methods of assessment of performance".

WORLD HEALTH AUTHORITY TO VISIT MONASH

Professor A. Leslie Banks, a world authority on the organisation of medical care, will spend a fortnight in the department of preventive and social medicine next month as visiting professor of community medicine and medical education.

He will be at the Alfred Hospital from November 10 to November 24.

Professor Banks, emeritus professor of human ecology at the University of Cambridge, is a consultant to the World Health Organisation and is the leader of a consultant team on health aspects of family planning, Division of Family Health.

He has a special interest in the organisation of medical care in developing countries and has spent a considerable time in India, where he was a visiting professor at King George's Medical College, Lucknow.

WORLD BANK ECONOMIST TO JOIN MONASH

Dr. Ross McDonald Parish, an economist with the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development in Washington, has been appointed to a chair of economics at Monash.

He is expected to take up his appointment in mid-1973.

A graduate of the University of Sydney, Dr. Parish worked for eight years as economics research officer in the NSW Department of Agriculture, spending the years 1956-1959 as a graduate student at the University of Chicago, where he gained his Ph.D.

In 1959, Dr. Parish joined the University of Sydney, where he was, in succession, lecturer and senior lecturer in agricultural economics until 1964, when he was appointed associate professor at the University of New England. He was appointed professor of economics in 1966 and held this appointment until November 1971, when he took up his present post with the World Bank.

Dr. Parish's major fields of study and research are micro-economics, welfare economics, public finance, the "new political economy" and agricultural economics, with particular reference to commodity marketing.
