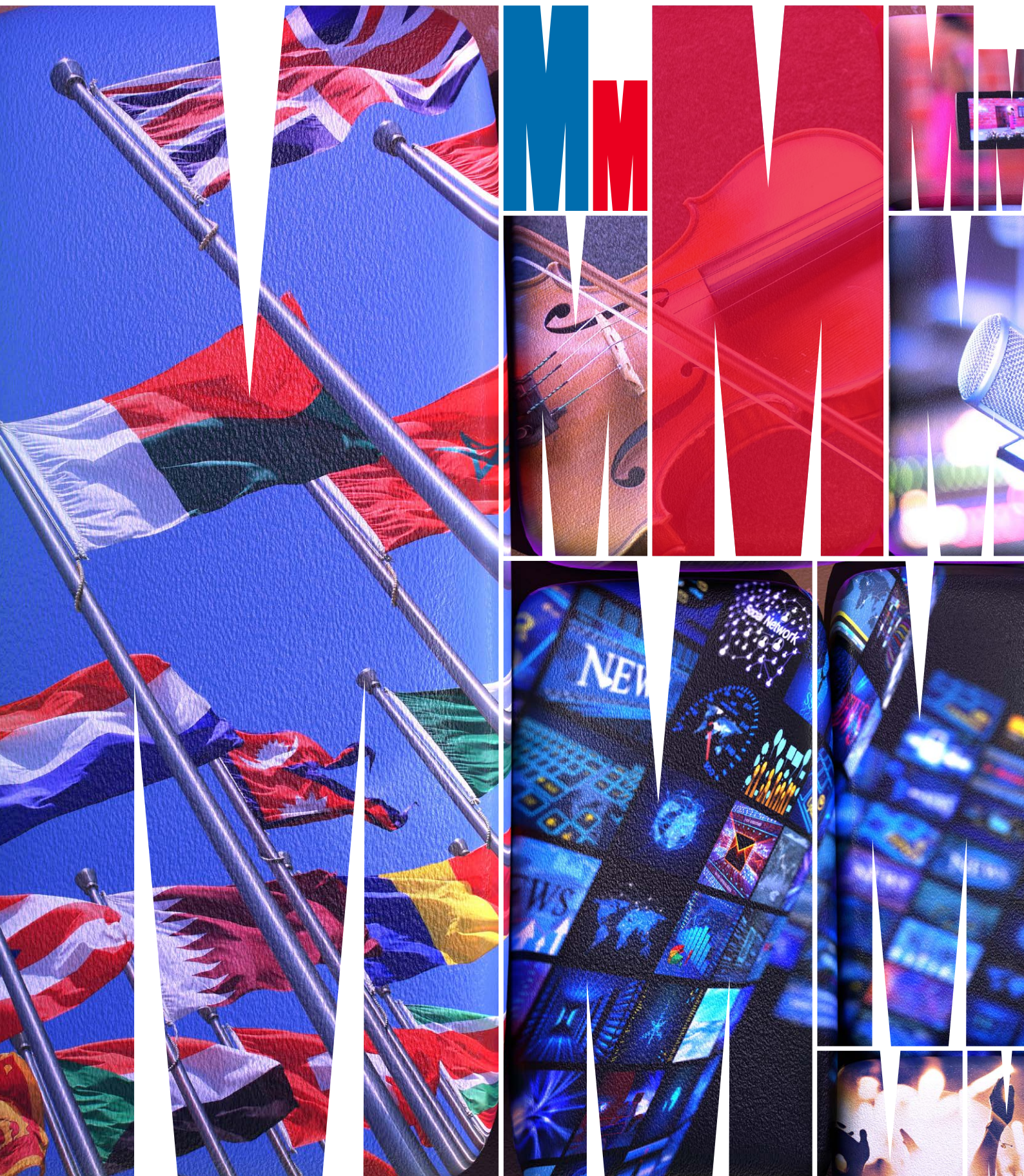

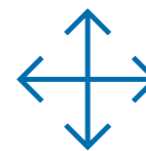

UNDERSTANDING THE TERMINOLOGY

COMPREHENSIVE DEGREE

At Monash Arts, this refers to the Bachelor of Arts. A comprehensive degree gives you the choice and flexibility to select your units (subjects), and requires you to complete 24 units in three years, including specific requirements such as completing an Arts major and Arts core units.

SPECIALIST DEGREE

At Monash Arts, this refers to the Bachelor of Criminology, Bachelor of Criminology and Policing, Bachelor of Global Studies, Bachelor of International Relations, Bachelor of Media Communication, Bachelor of Music, and Bachelor of Politics, Philosophy and Economics. You need to complete 24 units in three years and meet the core requirements of the degree, for example, completing one of the nominated specialisations, studying the prescribed minor, studying overseas, or undertaking a professional project.

UNITS

Sometimes called a subject, units are usually worth six credit points. You need to complete 144 credit points in a three-year degree. Some second-year and third-year units are worth 12 credit points, and are counted as two units – these units have a higher workload.

AREAS OF STUDY

An 'area of study' is a field of knowledge – for example, literary studies or sociology. Areas of study are sometimes called 'disciplines'. See pages 28-35.

MAJOR

A major is eight units from the same area of study. In the Bachelor of Arts, you don't have to decide on your major straight away.

SPECIALISATION

An Arts specialisation is a feature in some of the specialist degrees. These units will deepen your knowledge in a specific area, providing you with the practical and theoretical skills needed to critically analyse, communicate and apply your disciplinary knowledge.

FREE ELECTIVE

There are eight free elective units in all single Arts degrees. These can be taken from Arts or from another area such as Information Technology, Science or Business.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE

A bachelor's degree is also referred to as an undergraduate degree and is generally your first degree out of high school.

MASTER'S DEGREE

A master's degree is also referred to as a postgraduate degree and is a higher qualification to a bachelor's degree, usually taken after you've completed a bachelor's degree.

GET CAREER READY

The future of work is changing. And you need to keep up. It's vital you learn how to thrive in a competitive and tech heavy professional landscape. Lucky for you, Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences graduates get jobs that are at low risk of automation.

GRADUATE WITH AN EDGE

Within one to three years of graduation, 90% of Humanities, culture and social sciences graduates are in full-time employment,¹ and the employment outcomes and starting salaries of Arts graduates are on par with graduates from other disciplines.

Develop hands-on experience and industry connections as you earn credit towards your degree with an Industry Experience (IE) internship.

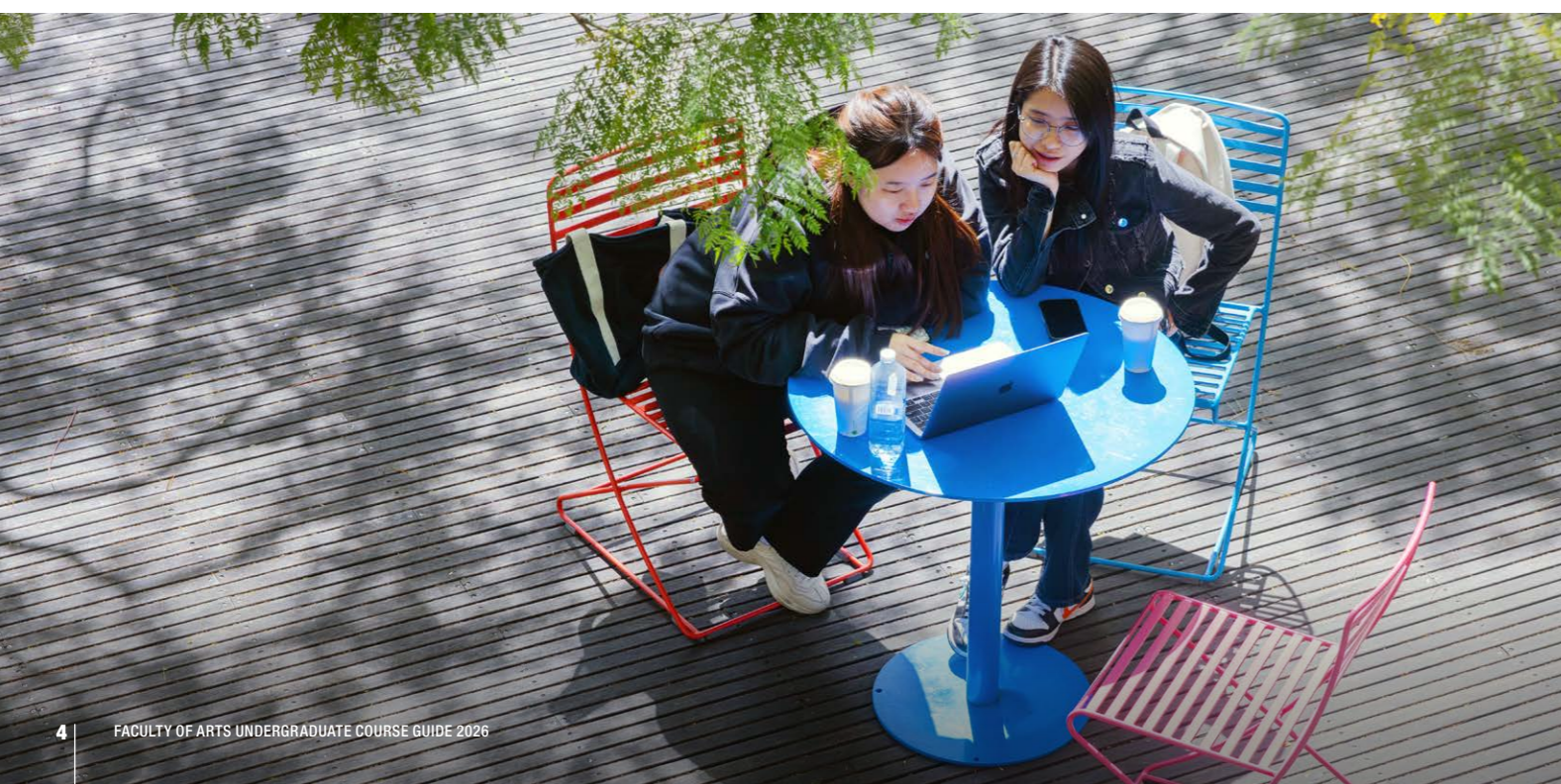

WHERE CAN I GO?

GLOBAL IMMERSION GUARANTEE

Monash's Global Immersion Guarantee (GIG) is an award-winning initiative that enables you to explore first-hand the relationships between society, technology and the environment. It's a two-week, funded study trip available to all first-year Monash single or double degree students to one of a variety of destinations.

The GIG is about innovating and putting your degree into practice by responding to some of the world's biggest challenges. You'll engage with people and organisations already working on these issues, and you'll have the opportunity to gain an understanding of the complexities and challenges involved in implementing sustainable and innovative solutions – all skills your future employers will look for.

Destinations have included: Fiji, Vanuatu, Indonesia, Italy, India, China, Malaysia and Samoa.

MONASH ARTS STUDY TOURS

We offer short-term study programs around the world. Varying from two to six weeks, and taught intensively, the tours run between semesters (June-July and November-January), which means you can continue to travel afterwards and/or potentially finish your degree sooner.

Examples of previous tour opportunities include:

- recognising and assessing the nature of consumption practices in Japan
- tracing the impact of criminal justice across different jurisdictions, and contrasting national and international examples of responses to crime in Italy
- mastering Mandarin in China
- formulating practical and innovative approaches to global challenges in Borneo
- exploring the dynamics that shaped interactions between Europe's Jews and their neighbours prior and during the Holocaust in Poland, the Czech Republic and Germany
- receiving formal and applied training in qualitative and ethnographic field research methods in Malaysia.

INTENSIVE LANGUAGE PROGRAMS

Studying overseas as part of your language major is a great way to immerse yourself in your chosen language and culture. Monash Arts offers a variety of faculty-led and endorsed language programs available to language students for credit.

INTERCAMPUS EXCHANGE TO MONASH MALAYSIA

Located in Bandar Sunway (close to Kuala Lumpur), Monash Malaysia was Monash's first international campus. The campus has more than 9000 students and a vibrant, global atmosphere.

Monash Malaysia makes available a wide-ranging selection of units, all taught in English. Intercampus exchange is available to all Monash Australia students, provided they have room within their course. Generous funding is available for this program to eligible students.

EXCHANGE TO A PARTNER INSTITUTION

An exchange program involves studying with one of our partner universities around the world – we have partnerships with 160 universities across 35 countries. You can go on exchange for one or two semesters and your overseas study is credited to your Monash degree. Financial assistance is available and there are no extra tuition fees.

STUDY ABROAD

If your preferred overseas destination is not a Monash partner university, you can still choose to go there on Study Abroad. You'll pay the host university's tuition fees for the time you're there, and you're still able to access financial assistance to support your travel.

PRATO GLOBAL CAMPUS INTENSIVE

Make the Monash Prato Centre your European study base. Close to Florence in the picturesque landscape of Tuscany, the Monash Prato Centre is located in the beautiful 18th-century Palazzo Vaj right in the centre of Prato.

The Global Campus Intensive program is open to students in their second year and beyond, and you can choose from a range of interdisciplinary and discipline-specific subjects. Divided into three-by-four-week intensive blocks, you can study for the full 12 weeks or take the option of including some travel time and study for four or eight weeks.

EXPAND YOUR KNOWLEDGE STUDY A DIPLOMA

DIPLOMA OF LANGUAGES

This diploma allows you to study Chinese Mandarin, Indonesian, Japanese, Korean or European languages (French, German, Italian, Spanish). There are different entry levels so you can commence as a beginner in the language or with a language background. If your language ability is higher than beginner level, you'll sit a language entry level test to determine the best place for you to continue with your language.

DIPLOMA OF LIBERAL ARTS

This diploma allows you to expand your studies by choosing any Arts area of study available as a major¹, except for languages which you can take in a Diploma of Languages.

WHY STUDY A DIPLOMA?

By studying a Diploma of Languages or a Diploma of Liberal Arts, you'll:

- Diversify and deepen your skills and knowledge in another area of study
- Expand your career options
- Continue with an area of study you have a keen interest in, or
- Try something completely different, like a new language.

WHO'S ELIGIBLE?

Monash students who are studying an eligible bachelor's single or double degree.

APPLYING FOR ENTRY

You can apply for entry to either of these diplomas only after you've accepted your offer into your main Monash Bachelor degree.

MONASH ARTS DOUBLE DEGREES

Dreaming of a career that blends diverse passions? Wanting to save time and money while simultaneously broadening your skill base? Take a double degree.

Monash University has one of the largest offerings of double degree combinations in Australia, and more than 50% of Monash Arts students are enrolled across our 40+ double degree combinations.

Craft a unique path to your dream profession, whether it's an international development lawyer (Arts + Laws), an environmental journalist (Arts + Science), an e-security policy specialist (Criminology + Information Technology), or a music teacher (Music + Education).

Double degree students' study towards two degrees at the same time, allowing you to keep your options open and develop expertise in different but complementary areas. But it doesn't mean double the work – an

undergraduate double degree course takes two years less to complete than studying the two degrees separately. So not only will you save time, you'll also save two years of course fees.

For admission into a double degree, generally the higher entry requirements apply of the two single degrees and you'll need to meet the subject prerequisites for both courses and satisfy any additional requirements. Some double degree combinations may require you to study across two campuses in order to complete your studies.



I chose to do a double degree because I didn't really know exactly what I wanted to do after university. I knew that I was passionate about science, but I really wanted to build on my other skills.

Doing a Monash Arts degree gave me a broad set of choices, so I could do whatever I wanted to do. I appreciated that flexibility.

My Arts degree has helped me with my communication and research skills. Having communication skills is important in my role because I'm doing technical work, which other people don't necessarily have the background to understand. I need to be able to work with those people to determine the question they want to solve, then explain how we're going to work out the answer, and then communicate that answer back to them."

BACHELOR OF ARTS

Workplaces of the future need innovative leaders who can see the bigger picture, and who have the human-focused and transferable skills you'll gain in a humanities and social sciences degree.

The Bachelor of Arts is designed to give you maximum flexibility and choice. With over 30 areas of study to choose from, our comprehensive arts degree allows you to design a unique course structure aligned with your worldview and career objectives. The course is built around deeply enriching experiences: you can choose from local and international internships, professional engagements and entrepreneurial opportunities, and the choice of more than 50 global immersion programs, preparing you to live and work in complex and culturally diverse environments, while building a network of like-minded peers.

THE MAJOR

Your major is made up of eight units. These units are from the same area of study² – for example, sociology, international relations or history. There are many units to choose from but there are also some compulsory units. These are called gateway, cornerstone and capstone units, which have been designed to help you consolidate your learning so you can get the most out of your major.

Gateway: a first-year foundation unit introducing you to the major.

Cornerstone: a second-year unit that focuses on making sure you have a solid grasp of your major.

Capstone: a third-year unit where you demonstrate advanced knowledge of your major, for example a supervised research project or an internship with an industry partner.

ARTS CORE UNITS

Your Arts core units will expose you to several arts disciplines contributing breadth to your knowledge of the arts, humanities and social sciences.

You'll also have the opportunity to customise your own professional journey according to your career interest with units that have been designed to build the skills and abilities employers value and seek across key areas, including leadership, intercultural expertise, industry experience, innovation capability and global immersion.

FREE ELECTIVES

There are eight free elective units with which you can study units from Arts or from another area such as Information Technology, Science or Business. You could also use these electives to engage in industry experience or study overseas.







BACHELOR OF CRIMINOLOGY

Improve responses to crime and criminality.

Criminology is the study of crime and social control. Crime – how we define it, how we understand its causes, and the ways we respond to it – provides a window into society's challenges, values and aspirations.

In this world-leading program you'll consider the local, national and global aspects of crime and justice, and become familiar with a range of lenses for understanding and assessing the impact of society's changing responses to crime and justice. You'll gain an understanding of victimisation and perpetration, inequality and its impacts, and approaches to understanding crime. Throughout the course you'll develop your capabilities via the key themes of expert knowledge, global reach and focus, and collaboration and innovation.

Your units will cover crime committed by individuals, groups, organisations and states, and the mechanisms of the criminal justice system, including police, courts and corrections.

Options are available to develop knowledge of specific criminal concerns, such as sexual violence, gendered violence, punishment, criminal justice processes, marginalisation, drugs, cybercrime, risk and surveillance, victimisation and perpetration, youth crime, and crime prevention and transnational justice practices.

EXPERT KNOWLEDGE

With its own advisory board, the Bachelor of Criminology brings into play the advice and dynamic perspectives of industry experts, meaning you'll benefit from current insights into industry developments.

GLOBAL REACH AND FOCUS

Throughout the course you'll be challenged to apply abstract knowledge to real-world problems of crime and justice, and develop solutions.

You'll also have the opportunity to travel internationally and meet criminal justice experts from across the world through a selection of exclusive field trips. The trips offer a truly immersive learning experience to complement the academic knowledge you'll gain in class, allowing you to engage in context and gain a genuine understanding of the human realities behind the study of criminology.

COLLABORATION AND INNOVATION

Through multiple opportunities for engagement with industry, you'll gain the experience needed to be workplace ready. In the final year unit *Being a Criminologist: Research and professional practice*, you'll work closely with our industry partners, opening up new pathways and opportunities for your career. The unit features real-life scenarios, and your work will be assessed by both academics and industry experts.

Further opportunities and internships are available to you through our Industry Experience internships, both in Australia and around the world, so you can get hands-on experience while you gain study credit.

FREE ELECTIVES

BACHELOR OF CRIMINOLOGY AND POLICING

Crime is a complex phenomena, which requires it to be viewed from various perspectives. In a joint-venture with Victoria Police, the Bachelor of Criminology and Policing is the only course of its kind in Australia.

In this three-year program, you'll complete the core requirements of Monash's Bachelor of Criminology, and have the opportunity to apply to undertake a Diploma of Policing, to be completed at the Victoria Police Academy in your third year.

The breadth and depth of our Bachelor of Criminology is a great foundation for anyone considering a career in policing or criminal justice. You'll gain an understanding of crime, the broader context in which crime occurs, the drivers of criminal behaviour, and the limits of formal and informal responses to crime.

Throughout your study you'll consider the local, national and global aspects of crime and justice, and become familiar with a range of lenses for understanding and assessing the impact of society's changing responses to crime and justice. You'll gain an understanding of victimisation and perpetration, inequality and its impacts, and approaches to understanding crime. Throughout the course you'll develop your capabilities via the key themes of expert knowledge, global reach and focus, and collaboration and innovation.

EXPERT KNOWLEDGE

Your study will address crime committed by individuals, groups, organisations and states, and the mechanisms of the criminal justice system, including police, courts and corrections.

Options are available to develop knowledge of specific criminal concerns, such as sexual violence, gendered violence, punishment, criminal justice processes, marginalisation, drugs, cybercrime, risk and surveillance, victimisation and perpetration, youth crime, and crime prevention and transnational justice practices.

DIPLOMA OF POLICING

The Bachelor of Criminology and Policing is a pathway to your policing career. During the course you will be provided with information which outlines the Victoria Police application process. If you want to pursue a career in Policing you will be required to apply to Victoria Police at the start of your second year of the course (Note: as part of the application process, you will be exempt from the Victoria Police Entrance Examination).

If accepted, during the third year of your course, you will undertake studies which will allow you to complete your bachelor degree and concurrently commence a Diploma of Policing with Victoria Police. You will also take part in an exclusive series of events designed specially to give you a deeper insight into life at the Academy and prepare you for your Victoria Police application. While studying at the Victoria Police Academy you'll also receive mentorship from Monash Criminology staff to support you in completing your Monash units.

Successful students will complete two separate qualifications, the Monash Bachelor of Criminology and the Victoria Police Diploma of Policing, increasing your employability.

ADDITIONAL SELECTION REQUIREMENTS

Entry into this degree also requires you submit a supplementary form as part of the application process and complete a police check, as well as applying for entry into the Diploma of Policing at the start of your second year of studies.

If you decide not to pursue a career in policing, or if you are unsuccessful in your attempts to enter the police force, you will be transferred into the Bachelor of Criminology degree (see page 14), where you will continue to extend your knowledge of criminology and develop skills and expertise which will allow you to engage necessary stakeholders to effectively formulate, influence and evaluate crime and justice policies and practices in a variety of professional contexts.

BACHELOR OF GLOBAL STUDIES

Do you aspire to become a leader in creating social change? Learn how to critically analyse global challenges facing cultures and communities around the world, and how to devise imaginative and well-informed solutions to help solve them.

The Bachelor of Global Studies is a unique course tackling the most important challenges that the world's communities face including: climate change; peace and conflict; the rich-poor gap; and crime and justice. Global studies is an interdisciplinary field drawing on politics, economics, sociology, history, medicine and science. You'll apply your knowledge and skills to real life scenarios through leadership, culture and globalisation core units; and an overseas study component.

CORE UNITS

You will study four core units on 'Leadership, culture and globalisation', exclusive to the Bachelor of Global Studies. You'll learn about forms of leadership, drivers of social change and how to apply your learning in practical and professional real-life contexts.

Classes are mainly workshops, where you'll engage in problem-based learning and develop skills in creativity, teamwork, cross-cultural collaboration, critical thinking, self-learning and analytical writing.

SPECIALIST KNOWLEDGE

Throughout your degree you'll gain in-depth knowledge of a specific facet or facets of global studies through units grounded in a wide variety of humanities and social science disciplines. These units will provide you with the practical and theoretical skills needed to critically analyse, communicate and formulate innovative solutions to global challenges. The units are grouped into the following streams:

SOCIAL JUSTICE

Tackle critical issues of power, and inequality through an exploration of historical and contemporary struggles against racism, colonialism, and economic disparity. Understand the roots of injustice and contribute to a more equitable world.

SUSTAINABILITY

Explore global environmental challenges and solutions through units on climate history, urban sustainability, and the intersection of climate change with social justice. Evaluate the past, understand the present, and design a sustainable future for our planet.

CULTURE AND IDENTITY

Explore how social identities are formed through global circulation of cultural beliefs and practices. Understand the role of culture in creating meaningful, and sometimes contested, worldviews.

GLOBAL COMMUNICATION

Understand how language shapes our engagement with a diverse and interconnected world. Develop the strategies and skills of communication needed to thrive in internationalised workplaces.

There is also the option to take the unit Developing research literacy if you are interested in pursuing research related to global studies after graduating.

OVERSEAS STUDY

Integral to this course is overseas study that can be completed across a full semester or taken intensively. You could take units offered at a Monash international location, join one of our many study tours, or study at one of our prestigious partner universities. It's compulsory to take at least three overseas study units, but you can take more if you want.

FREE ELECTIVES

BACHELOR OF INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Trade agreements, diplomatic alliances and territorial disputes, cooperation and conflict are all consistent themes on the global stage.

The Bachelor of International Relations is a three-year specialist degree that allows you to concentrate on studying the dynamics of power, governance, conflict, and cooperation at local, national and international levels.

Taught by experts in international relations and politics, this course helps you understand how politics impacts our lives; teaches you to analyse power dynamics; giving you the skills to make positive changes in the world.

Throughout your study you'll be encouraged to develop your skills of critical and analytical thinking, teamwork, communication, intercultural competence, and applied research skills and to use them to address the pressing challenges in international relations.

WHAT YOU'LL STUDY

Over the course of your degree you'll study foreign policy, security studies, international political economy, and global governance. You'll uncover how national and global political institutions operate, how and why conflict and cooperation occur, and the role that power, political ideas, material resources, civil society, and historical legacies play in shaping the opportunities and the constraints for political actors, institutions, states and the wider structure of the international system.

FIRST-YEAR CORE UNITS

INTRODUCTION TO INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Engage with key issues in international relations including international security, arms control, violence and terrorism, migration and the climate crisis. Examine the role of states and supra-state organisations; nations and nationalism; world order and global governance; and globalisation and the international political economy.

GEOPOLITICAL SECURITY IN THE INDO-PACIFIC

Explore the core geopolitical challenges in the Indo-Pacific region, including great power competition; emerging and middle powers; competing regional and international organisations; democratic versus authoritarian states; liberal versus illiberal values; developmental and human security challenges; climate change; and migration and refugee flows.

POLITICAL THEORY IN A CHANGING WORLD: CONCEPTS, ISSUES AND DEBATES

Consider key political theory concepts such as freedom, democracy, equality and justice and apply them to cases and controversies central to public debate and policymaking in a rapidly changing world.

ISSUES IN AUSTRALIAN POLITICS AND GOVERNMENT

Investigate the politics, government and key issues that challenge the Australian liberal democratic state. You'll unpack the key theoretical issues and debates in Australian politics and governance and interrogate the ideas about power that underpin them.

ELECTIVE STREAMS

In addition to your core units of study, you will have access to five elective streams:

- Peace, conflict and security
- Policy and governance
- Comparative politics
- Development, rights and gender
- Climate futures.

These elective streams are designed to deepen your expertise on those areas of international relations and politics in which you plan to pursue your future career. You will also have the opportunity to use your free electives to pick up an additional stream.

FREE ELECTIVES

There are eight free electives in the course. That means you'll have the flexibility to take units from another discipline within Arts, such as history or a language, or from another faculty such as Business, Information Technology or Science. These electives will add diversity to your skill set, making you stand out from your peers.

OVERSEAS STUDY

During your second or third year of study, you will have the opportunity to take the study tour unit The European Union: Challenges, crises and opportunities, at our Prato, Italy campus.

This unit gives you the opportunity to gain a deep understanding of the origins of today's European Union, what is driving it forward and what is pulling it apart. Using inter-disciplinary approaches incorporating science, law and economics you'll simulate policy paths and come to understand the forces shaping the EU's relations with Australia and the world.

That means you'll have the flexibility to take units from another discipline within Arts, such as politics or a language, or from another faculty such as Business, Information Technology or Science. These electives will complement your specialisation and add diversity to your skill set, making you stand out from your peers.

SPECIALISATIONS

There are four specialisations to choose from. You'll start first year with two specialisations and decide in second year which one to pursue as your primary specialisation.

JOURNALISM

Make the news and make stories that matter. Spanning digital, audio, video and print media, this specialisation makes use of the Monash Media Lab to give you the practical and creative skills required to excel in a rewarding journalism career.

MEDIA

You'll become a true media expert in today's fast-evolving world, building skills and knowledge in media research, management, communication and policy. You'll develop skills in media analysis that have applications across a wide range of professional contexts – from social media strategy in organisations to media management and communication, and media policy.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

You'll learn how to research, develop, apply and then evaluate communication strategies. You'll develop global perspectives, understand the importance of the management of stakeholder relationships and reputation, acquire skills in public opinion analysis, learn to identify and manage organisational issues, and develop a crisis management plan.

SCREEN


Screen industries, technologies and cultures are changing faster than ever. This specialisation gives you the knowledge to understand these transformations, navigating how film, television and newer screen formats have led to and function within contemporary media ecologies.

Looking at global and local film cultures, you'll examine the power and influence screen has to share stories, and its ability to influence and change society. You'll also develop your practical video production skills relevant to a broad range of media platforms and screen cultures.

GRADUATE WITH A PORTFOLIO TO SHOW EMPLOYERS

From day one, you'll develop practical experience and work-ready skills to build a portfolio of real work throughout your course. This could be projects such as a documentary, short film or digital marketing campaign, depending on your interest area. The result is a collection of tangible pieces of work you can take out and show to potential employers.

BACHELOR OF MUSIC

The Sir Zelman Cowen School of Music and Performance has one of the most comprehensive music programs in the country. The School excels in classical, jazz and popular music performance, with vibrant programs in composition, improvisation and creative music technology.

The Bachelor of Music is focussed on your music journey and on your career development. You'll have weekly one-to-one lessons, collaborate with students in other specialisations, learn from accomplished music staff and engage with international artists.

The course comprises 24 units. These units work through three themes and electives.

THEMES

MUSIC SPECIALIST STUDY

You will choose one of the three specialisations offered: Music performance (classical or jazz and improvisation), Popular music, or Composition and music technology.

MUSIC THEORY AND EAR TRAINING

These units integrate the development of aural skills with the theoretical understanding of music through listening, analysis, performance, notation and composition.

MUSIC CONTEXT STUDY

POPULAR MUSIC

Designed for popular music performers and creators of the future, in addition to developing practical performance skills and stagecraft, you'll learn how to engage with a broad range of tools, performance styles and contexts representative of the popular music industry.

You'll start by developing techniques and practice strategies on your principal instrument or voice across a range of musical styles and repertoires. These skills will be applied in both solo and ensemble performance contexts in song-writing, live and recording environments.

You'll have the opportunity to conceptualise and create a live performance and recording project under the guidance of expert teachers within your chosen musical style and/or context.

COMPOSITION AND MUSIC TECHNOLOGY

In this specialisation you'll develop skills in composition and music technology for acoustic and electronic instruments, song-writing and music for other media such as film and video games. You'll have the opportunity to collaborate with performance students, write for visiting international artists and make your own recording projects. Through our partnership with the Melbourne Electronic Sound Studio (MESS), you'll have access to vintage electronic equipment.

Our ongoing program of local, national and international visiting artists and workshops means you'll create established contacts with industry and be prepared for global career opportunities.

PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

Monash is renowned for its performance opportunities and we have a diverse range of small and large ensembles, including piano ensembles, choral groups (gospel, contemporary and classical), electronic laptop, new music, string sinfonia, wind symphony, funk, pop, Latin jazz, Gamelan, small jazz ensembles (including Australian jazz and Brazilian) as well as the Monash Art Ensemble and the Monash Academy Orchestra.

BACHELOR OF POLITICS, PHILOSOPHY AND ECONOMICS

Developed by Monash's world-renowned politics, philosophy and economics professors, this course is designed for deep thinkers who want to have a real impact on shaping our society.

Throughout the Bachelor of Politics, Philosophy and Economics you'll develop your ability to think critically about analysis, strategy and leadership and you'll learn how to transform big ideas into tangible results. You'll engage with researchers and global leaders to hone the industry relevant abilities needed to thrive in a world defined by constant technological, environmental, political and population change.

An Industry Advisory Board guides the direction and development of the course, ensuring that all units are informed by expert insider knowledge.

COURSE STRUCTURE

You'll be required to complete six gateway (introductory) units from all three specialisations in your first year of study, and nominate one specialisation at the end of your first year. You'll complete four units in Analysis, Strategy and Leadership and you'll have eight free electives which can be taken from Arts or from another area such as Information Technology, Science or Business.
