### TRAVEL GRANTS 1973

The Australian-American Educational Foundation announces that travel grants are available to Australian citizens to go to the United States for research, study or lecturing at United States universities and other institutions of higher learning for projects commencing between May 1973 and April 30, 1974.

Applicants must be Australian citizens; hold a university degree or equivalent professional qualifications, and undertake to return to Australia to reside on completion of the grant. (Grants cannot be given to attend conferences alone.)

Grants are available in three categories – for Senior Scholars (Closing Date for Applications: November 17, 1972); Post Doctoral Fellows (November 24, 1972); Postgraduate Students (January 28, 1973).

## ENVIRONMENT CONFERENCE AT MONASH

Several of the leading speakers in Melbourne this week for the Fourth International Congress on Human Relations will be coming to Monash for a five-hour conference on Wednesday afternoon, August 30.

The conference, which will be in Robert Blackwood Hall from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. is being organised by the Australian Union of Students.

Speakers scheduled to appear at Monash include Dr. L. Solari (from Italy and a member of the Club of Rome) and five others, all from the US: Lamont Cole (zoology, Cornell University), Hazel Henderson (Council on Economic Priorities), Kenneth Boulding (economics, University of Colorado), Stewart Udall (Secretary of the Interior, US government) and Joseph Sax (University of Michigan Law School).

## LECTURES ON SCIENCE AND ECONOMICS

Two annual Monash lectures will be delivered in the Alexander Theatre early in September.

The first, the Monash Economics Lecture, will be given by Professor R. W. Clower, Professor of Economics at the University of California, Los Angeles. It will be on September 4 at 8.15 p.m.

His topic is "The Ideas of Economists — A discussion of the nature of economic thinking and its relation to contemporary policy issues."

Admission is by invitation and enquiries should be made to Ivan Gregory, ECOPS faculty secretary.

The second lecture is the Oscar Mendelsohn Lecture and it will be held at 8.15 p.m. on September 6. The speaker will be Professor J.A. Passmore, Professor of Philosophy, Institute of Advanced Studies at the Australian National University.

The title is "The Revolt Against Science". The lecture is free and open to the general public.

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The third lecture in the series of seven lectures on education being presented by the Education Faculty will be held on September 5 at 8 p.m. in R2. The speaker will be Dr. F. J. Hunt, senior lecturer in education, and his topic is "Schooling — and some alternatives."

## TALK ON FOREIGN LANGUAGE TEACHING

A former associate professor in the Department of French, Professor Wilga Rivers, will return to Monash this week to give a public lecture on the problems facing the teaching of foreign languages. She will cover the world-wide trend of a decline in foreign language teaching.

Professor Rivers is now professor of French at the University of Illinois. Her lecture, entitled "Foreign languages in a time of change", will be given at 1.15 p.m. on Tuesday, August 29, in R 6.

## \$500 BURSARY FOR RESEARCH

The Australian Federation of University Women has awarded the 1972 \$500 Freda Page Bursary to Miss Kay Patterson, a PhD. student in the Education Faculty.

The bursary is awarded to members of the federation to provide assistance in postgraduate studies and research. Miss Patterson's research involves specific learning disabilities in children and she will use the bursary to buy equipment for her work.
