Monash Indigenous Entry Scheme

Through VTAC, Indigenous Australian applicants can gain direct admission to a range of Monash Medicine, Nursing, and Health Sciences undergraduate degrees with an achieved ATAR of 50+ (higher for some degrees).

- Health Sciences (Indigenous Entry) 50 ATAR
- Nursing (Indigenous Entry) 50 ATAR
- Occupational Therapy (Honours – Indigenous Entry) 50 ATAR
- Paramedicine (Indigenous Entry) 50 ATAR
- Public Health (Indigenous Entry) 50 ATAR
- Radiation Sciences (Indigenous Entry) 60 ATAR
- Speech Pathology (Indigenous Entry) 50 ATAR.

There are no extra requirements or time added to your course when you start a course via this entry scheme, and you will be supported throughout your degree by the University and the Gukwonderuk Indigenous Health Workforces Centre.

PATHWAYS

Monash Indigenous Access Program

The Monash Indigenous Access Program (MIAP) is a full-time bridging program that prepares students for entry into many undergraduate health courses. MIAP is also ABSTUDY-approved.

Students typically complete 12-months of study which includes academic writing skills, learning how to study in a university, knowledge and context and maths. Students also study units from the degree they are aiming to study. On successfully completing the program students transfer into their destination course.

You can apply if you:

- Haven't completed Year 12
- Graduated with a non-ATAR pathway, for instance, a TAFE course, VCE ungraded, VCE Vocational Major, or it's been some time since you did year 12.
- Received an ATAR under 50
- Have not studied at a university
- Are mature aged without previous study experience.

JOIN OUR COMMUNITY

Join over 200 Indigenous students who are studying health courses and get involved in Indigenous student activities and events.

Kirrip Mentor Program

Kirrip means friend in the Woiwurrung language. The Kirrip program matches every Indigenous first year medicine, nursing and allied health student with another Indigenous student in a higher year level.

Kirrip Leadership Program

Become a student leader in medicine, nursing or allied health, and attend sessions designed to help you learn what it is to be an Indigenous leader in healthcare, attend Indigenous led workshops, meet with Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisations (ACCHOs) and more.

National and International Indigenous Health Professional Networks

Become a member of Indigenous health professional groups, such as, the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses, Indigenous Allied Health Australia or the Australian Indigenous Doctors Association. We provide you with various support to attend their annual conferences and associated international conferences.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND SUPPORT

Apply for travel and accommodation support

You can apply to have expenses associated with relocating to Monash University from a rural or interstate location covered. You can also apply for a scholarship to cover the full or partial costs of staying in Monash Residential Services on campus.

Costs of prescribed textbooks covered

The William Cooper Institute provides a bursary to cover the costs of prescribed textbooks.

Scholarships

The 'Achieving Potential Indigenous Support Scholarship' is guaranteed if you are an Indigenous Australian and intending to study an undergraduate or graduate (coursework) degree. The scholarship provides \$6500 per annum (48 credit points of study) for the duration of your degree. There are many other scholarships you can apply for.

Apply for an Indigenous Student Bursary

Students can apply to the bursary for costs of admission tests, course related expenses such as uniforms, working with children checks, police checks, fitness tests, immunisations and sorry business attendance.

Benefit from tutoring

Excel in your studies with our free Indigenous tutoring program.

Apply for a cadetship

We link you to cadetship opportunities in local health services, such as Monash Health, Peninsula Health, Eastern Health, the Royal Women's Hospital and many more. You get to work part-time and hone your healthcare skills.



HANDS ON HEALTH

The Gukwonderuk Hands on Health program is an exciting opportunity for primary and high school-aged Indigenous students to engage in healthcare careers in a culturally relevant way.

Indigenous community events and programs

Hands on Health can provide a stall with health career information and interactive activities.

Primary school students

We provide Incursions where students create a kangaroo medicine band, are introduced to various healthcare careers and receive a free health careers activity book. Students can also visit the Monash campus for a Discovery Day to learn about university life and engage with Indigenous medicine plants.

Secondary school students

We offer incursions for Indigenous students to engage with hands-on activities about health careers, learn about study pathways to university and gain an introduction to Indigenous medicines.

Students can also visit a Monash campus for a Discovery Day to learn about being a university student. Additionally, students can undertake work experience with Hands on Health.

Meet and greet

Hands on Health team visit Indigenous students one-on-one or in groups to discuss health careers and study options.
