MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTORS

We are pleased to present the Monash Addiction Research Centre's Annual Report for 2021-2022

The 2021-2022 financial year has seen the Centre's work and influence continue to grow. 2022 heralded the opportunity to recommence face-to-face activities, including running our annual symposium for the first time since 2019. There was a buzz of excitement as we came together in one room to celebrate all the incredible addiction-related projects being carried out across Monash by researchers at all career stages. Professor Alison Ritter AO, an international expert in drug policy, launched the day as our keynote speaker and we were fortunate to have Fiona Patten MP join us for our afternoon panel discussion 'Changing the Conversation'.

Despite the challenges brought on by COVID over the past two years, we are so proud of the amazing researchers across MARC, who secured over \$26 million in funding in the past financial year and published over 200 peer-reviewed articles. This is an extraordinary effort, and on behalf of the Centre, we would like to congratulate all of our members on an outstanding year.

In the second half of 2021, we wrapped up our 10-part interdisciplinary webinar series, which included international experts, such as Associate Professor Kelly Dunn from the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, who discussed the opioid-sparing potential of cannabinoids. In March 2022, we held a policy webinar which brought together a range of experts and voices to discuss and unpack current policy challenges and opportunities in the addiction field. 'Making addiction a national priority - the need to end stigma' was a resounding success with more than 250 registrations.

Our professional development offerings continued for our EMCRs with an in-depth policy workshop, as well as a science communication series. Our network of talented PhD students continued to grow and thrive, and in 2021 we were delighted to see our first MARC PhD scholars graduate.

We have continued to strengthen our policy and advocacy work, including a submission to the Commonwealth Post-Market Review of Opiate Dependence Treatment Program (ODTP) Medicines in October 2021. In March 2022, we published a position statement supporting the decriminalisation of the personal possession and use of small quantities of all prohibited drugs and contributed to, and were signatories of, a statement on the alcohol industry's review of its Alcohol Beverages Advertising Code (ABAC) scheme.

It is these achievements and the dedication of our members and core staff that have contributed to enhancing the reputation of MARC throughout 2021-2022.

On behalf of MARC, we would like to thank our advisory board, theme leaders, members, research partners and the community for their ongoing support and we look forward to another successful year in 2023.

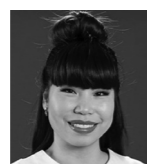

FUNDING SUCCESS

MARC researchers have been awarded more than \$26 million in research funding to conduct research relating to addiction, substance use and related behaviours. The below examples of funding success demonstrate the strength of interdisciplinary collaboration amongst our members.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE OUTCOMES OF INJECTING DRUG USE AND METHAMPHETAMINE SMOKING

Injection drug use and methamphetamine smoking is associated with the majority of illicit drug-related harms and associated costs in Australia. This project will extend our studies of people who inject drugs and people who smoke methamphetamine through record linkage to social and criminal justice datasets. The project will characterise the trajectories of participants through social services (e.g. public housing) and law enforcement systems to provide a comprehensive account of social and criminal justice impacts of injection drug use and methamphetamine use in Australia for the first time.

The project will determine the:

- incidence of key outcomes such as arrest, imprisonment, social housing utilisation and changes to the government benefits participants receive;
- impacts of law enforcement and criminal justice intervention on drug use trajectories and drug-related harm; and
- impacts of key interventions, policies and behaviours on criminal justice outcomes.

This project is funded by the Australian Research Council.

SCOPING SERVICE GAPS IN MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT OF OPIOID DEPENDENCE (MATOD) BY EVALUATING LIVED EXPERIENCES OF ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS NURSING PRACTITIONERS (AODNPS) IN RURAL AND REGIONAL VICTORIA.

MATOD is an evidenced harm reduction approach for the treatment of people impacted by opioid dependence. However, there is chronic shortage of MATOD prescribers in regional/rural areas which is the result of well-documented stigma and discrimination associated with drug users, substantially complicating and potentially slowing recruitment efforts.

To address system level issues related to prescriber recruitment and retention in regional and rural areas, the role of other health professionals, namely AODNPs is gaining increasing attention. Cross-national studies have noted the important role AODNPs can play in managing, meeting and administering the complex needs of MATOD consumers. In Australia and particularly Victoria, a comprehensive understanding of the facilitators and barriers to the successful adoption and scale-up of AODNPs in regional and rural MATOD delivery is at best anecdotal or fragmented. Similarly, workforce capability, access to professional training and the role of higher education providers in fulfilling prescriber gaps in regional/rural Victoria is relatively unexamined.

The aim of this project is to investigate how AODNP's can contribute to filling prescriber gaps in MATOD treatments in regional/remote/rural regions in Victoria.

USING AMBULANCE DATA TO CREATE A CONTEMPORARY MODEL OF ALCOHOL-RELATED HARMS FOR POLICY MAKERS

Alcohol is a leading cause of injury, chronic disease, and mortality. Alcohol availability and consumption patterns have changed substantially during the COVID-19 pandemic. Victorian licensing regulations have been relaxed, resulting in an increased number of locations able to sell alcohol, and rapid deliveries now available. A 2021 review of The Liquor Control Reform Act confirmed these regulatory changes will not be wound back. This has created a rapidly changing environment, where evidence is lacking about where and when these harms occur and who is most at risk, placing the Victorian community at greater risk of harm.

Assessing changes in alcohol-related harms in the post-COVID-19 recovery is timely, as changes to liquor licensing and harms associated with new norms post-COVID-19 may differ significantly from pre-COVID-19. There are substantial public health benefits of this work stemming from the complete coverage of the Victorian population by NASS. A second major advantage is the mixed-methods approach, allowing key stakeholders, treatment services, government and patients to be directly involved through the co-design process. This will enable policy makers to have locally relevant information on alcohol-related harms in both metropolitan and regional areas, and to have contextualised information on those harms beyond population metrics. This also has significant benefits for VicHealth as part of its work to address culture change. For example, results from the present study could be used to target future ads or education campaigns around specific 'hotspot' locations; sub-populations at risk of harm and types of harm (e.g., violence vs injury).

ENHANCING PHARMACIST INVOLVEMENT IN CARE (EPIC) MATOD IMPLEMENTATION STUDY

Access to MATOD is poor in many parts of Victoria, with a large geographic disparity in service provision. The Enhancing Pharmacist Involvement in Care (EPIC)-MATOD project has developed a model of care to expand treatment capacity by using community pharmacists at their full scope of practice, in collaboration with MATOD prescribers, in areas where access to prescribers is poor. The project is led by the Monash Addiction Research Centre and Frankston Mornington Primary Care Partnership's RAD-FMP initiative, in collaboration with local and state government and peak professional and consumer organisations.

The model of care will be piloted with patients at a number of MATOD pharmacies in the Frankston Mornington Peninsula (FMP) region. The pilot study aims to determine whether a collaborative model improves treatment access and retention; identify factors important for successful implementation; and determine the cost per patient of delivering the model of care. Findings will help identify the resources and strategies needed to scale up a collaborative model of care to other geographic areas with similar needs to expand access to MATOD.

The pilot study is funded by the Victorian Department of Health through an Alcohol and Drug Research Innovation Agenda (ADRIA) Research Grant.

THE ROLE OF ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS IN ROAD CRASH RELATED AMBULANCE ATTENDANCE

Turning Point and their National Addiction Mental Health Surveillance Unit (NAMHSU) team have entered into a collaboration that provides public health surveillance of alcohol and other drug-related ambulance attendances involving traffic crashes in Victoria for 2022. This is a continuation of a 2021 pilot project. TAC will fund NAMHSU to use the National Ambulance Surveillance System to code and report on road traffic crashes that involve alcohol and other drugs. This data will be used by the TAC to help inform safety and policy in road safety and help to gain an improved understanding of road users who drink or drug drive. Both TAC and NAMHSU hope this will become an ongoing collaboration that will improve the understanding of trends and patterns of drink and drug driving crashes.

This project is funded by the TAC.



COMPLETED RESEARCH

‘UNDERSTANDING EMERGING OPIOID-RELATED HARMS THROUGH IMPROVED SURVEILLANCE, DRUG CHECKING AND INFORMATION SHARING SYSTEMS’

In Australia, increases in unintentional heroin deaths and overdoses have been observed in recent years, yet, it is not clear what is driving these changes. To understand rising opioid-related harms, there is a need for systems to gather timely information on changing opioid overdose patterns and risk factors, including the involvement of emerging drugs.

This project focused on developing novel methods for monitoring for emerging harmful substances.

This was a multi-centre project led by MARC’s Deputy Director Suzanne Nielsen and coordinated by MARC members Tina Lam and Louisa Picco, in collaboration with Sarah Hiley, and Nico Clark of the Medically Supervised Injecting Room (MSIR) at North Richmond Community Health, Julie Latimer and Marianne Jauncey of the Uniting Medically Supervised Injecting Centre (MSIC), Monica Barratt of RMIT University, Emma Tay of the Western Sydney Local Health District, Dimitri Gerostamoulos and Linda Glowacki of the Victorian Institute of Forensic Medicine (VIFM), Claude Roux and Marie Morelato of the University of Technology Sydney, Elodie Lefrançois of the University of Lausanne, Switzerland and Portland-based public health technologist Michael Gilbert.

REACH - REDUCING ALCOHOL RELATED HARM IN GENERAL PRACTICE

Alcohol is a major source of harm. More than 1200 deaths each year and 43,736 Disability Adjusted Life Years (DALYs) are attributable to alcohol in Victoria alone. Risky alcohol use has ramifications for health and wellbeing, and affects families and the wider community through absenteeism, family violence, assaults, and motor vehicle collisions. People from low income groups are affected by alcohol related harms more, and at lower levels of alcohol intake, than people from higher income groups.

General practice plays an essential role in reducing alcohol-related harm in communities, as nearly 85 percent of Victorians see a GP at least annually. Brief interventions involve assessing the amount of alcohol a person is using, and offering individualised advice on how to reduce the associated health risks. These are effective in reducing the average amount of alcohol people consume in a week, and are recommended in the RACGP Preventive Care guidelines for all patients over the age of 15 years. Despite their effectiveness and the support for this approach in evidence-based guidelines, clinicians do not routinely provide this intervention in daily practice.

This project tested a new approach for embedding brief interventions for alcohol in general practice. The project team partnered with six general practices situated in low-income communities in North West and South East Melbourne to test a new package of resources. It used both qualitative and quantitative data to assess the acceptability, feasibility, and relative effectiveness of the intervention.

UNDERSTANDING POLICY, MEDIA, AND ACADEMIC NARRATIVES AROUND CYCLES OF DISADVANTAGE IN AUSTRALIA

How do narratives change over time, and what can we learn about who is and isn't included or heard in these public forums? When discussing complex issues of multidimensional disadvantage and wellbeing, which topics are framed in relation to each other, and what does that tell us about our policy focus? How can narrative analysis inform our advocacy as communities and the for-purpose sector?

Using a transdisciplinary perspective and cutting-edge algorithmic discourse analysis methods, this project aimed to provide a path-breaking tool to identify and track changes in public narratives about disadvantage. This tool aimed to provide a structured way of understanding public attitudes to disadvantage – and ultimately inform their own planning, reporting, impact assessments, and activities aiming to influence public narratives about disadvantage as they emerge. The large-scale, longitudinal data generated by this project provided the key to answering a broad range of questions about how narratives emerge, and how they can influence, reinforce and break cycles of disadvantage. This opens the door to a broad array of future projects that link this dataset to others (e.g. statistics on employment, crime, health, social capital, etc.) to understand how narratives influence employment, crime, health, and well-being outcomes; test the effect of campaigns that aim to alter public narratives; and identify events that disrupt intergenerational and intersectional cycles of disadvantage.

PERSISTENCE OF OPIOID USE FOLLOWING SURGICAL ADMISSION

Investigators: Dr Tina Lam, Dr Ting Xia, Professor Dan Lubman, Associate Professor Suzanne Nielsen

This data linkage study analysed administrative data from hospital and community pharmacies to compare rates of persistent opioid use in opioid naïve patients prescribed one of two pharmaceutical opioids (tapentadol and oxycodone) for post-surgical analgesia. The study analysed the records of 120,000 hospital patients who were discharged from surgery across three Australian states and who were continuing to use opioids three months post surgery, a period when most people are expected to have discontinued pain relieving medication. The study found lower rates of longer-term use for patients prescribed tapentadol in particular surgical sub groups. Given this is one of the first studies specifically looking at tapentadol as a discharge opioid on longer-term outcomes, the clinical outcomes may see clinicians take into consideration the longer-term side effects of these opioids when prescribing post operative pain relief to patients.

MAPPING THE ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG PATIENT JOURNEY TO IMPROVE TREATMENT ACCESS AND ENGAGEMENT IN CARE

Alcohol and other drugs (AOD) are involved in 137,000 Australian hospital admissions and 28 percent of ED injuries. This harm is preventable. Understanding patients' journeys through health systems can inform more effective delivery of evidence-based treatments. This study used novel approaches to combine big data and qualitative methods, including graphical journey mapping, to comprehensively document the patient journey to identify opportunities for increasing connection to, and retention in AOD care.

HOSPITALITY DRINKING CULTURES

Drinking alcohol during or after a shift has long been common practice among hospitality workers, especially male hospitality workers. However, attitudes toward alcohol are starting to change. As part of VicHealth's Men's Risky Drinking Initiative and in partnership with Chisholm TAFE, "Hospo drinking cultures" seeks to amplify these changes through a series of short animated documentaries. The project team surveyed and interviewed hospitality students and staff to inform the development and delivery of a co-designed and animated multimedia campaign. The campaign addressed cultures of risky drinking among male hospitality students and hospitality staff that mentor them in workplace settings. In so doing, the project aimed to cultivate skills, workplace settings and norms that facilitate low risk-drinking, alternative post-work practices and care.

BUILDING ADDICTION RESEARCH CAPACITY

WEBINARS

INTERDISCIPLINARY WEBINAR SERIES

In the second half of 2021, we held our final two webinars in our 10-part interdisciplinary series. For our July webinar we welcomed Associate Professor Kelly Dunn from the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. Prof Dunn was joined by Associate Professor Suzi Nielsen and Prof Rachelle Buchbinder to discuss whether cannabinoids can help us address the opioid crisis

In September, MARC members Dr Susan Baidawi, Associate Professor Deb Scott and Dr Christine Grove presented on the topic *Vulnerable children - Substance use among young people and caregivers in child protection systems*. Susan, Deb and Christine discussed substance use among young people with a focus on the 'crossover' of children at the nexus of the youth justice and child protection systems, and the implications of caregiver substance abuse in children's involvement in the system.

MAKING ADDICTION A NATIONAL PRIORITY - THE NEED TO END STIGMA

In March 2022, we held the first webinar in our new series focusing on changing the conversation around addiction. *Making addiction a national priority - the need to end stigma* featured panellists, including Mary O'Hagan from the Victorian Department of Health, Caterina Giorgi from Foundation for Alcohol Research & Education (FARE), Dr Michael Doyle from the Centre for Research Excellence in Indigenous Health and Alcohol and Dr Adam Bourne from La Trobe University. The panel discussed what we can do to address the stigma surrounding addiction and improve health outcomes, and how we can make responding to addiction a national policy priority.

WORKSHOPS

EMCR POLICY WORKSHOP

In November 2021, MARC led an EMCR policy workshop focusing on what public policy is and how researchers can translate their research findings in a way that makes it accessible to policymakers. Participants also engaged in a group exercise to translate the results of an academic paper into a short pitch to policymakers through the CPR model: **Context, Problem, Response**.

We had a great turnout for our science communication workshop on Tuesday, 10 August 2021 with science communication expert, Associate Professor Jen Martin, sharing some great tips on how to deliver effective, engaging and confident presentations.

In the workshop, Associate Professor Martin presented different strategies researchers can use as the basis for any great presentation. This included the GAMPER strategy - **Goal, Audience, Message, Platform, Evaluate and Refine**.

Associate Professor Martin also shared the three key stages (planning, design and delivery) to focus on when preparing a talk, the top five tips for public speaking, and the top seven tips for presenting online.



2022 MARC SYMPOSIUM

The 2022 MARC Symposium was held on Thursday, 19 May at the Monash Caulfield campus. The one-day event brought together world-leading addiction researchers from across Monash University and the broader sector to discuss and address harms relating to alcohol, other drugs and gambling.

More than 100 people attended the symposium with presentations from over 20 speakers, including a keynote presentation from Prof Alison Ritter from the University of NSW, and an afternoon panel discussion with Prof Ritter, Fiona Patten MP, Associate Professor Charles Livingstone and moderated by MARC Advisory Board chair, Mietta Gibson.

POLICY AND ENGAGEMENT

IMPROVING OPIATE DEPENDENCE TREATMENT

Opioid-related overdose deaths are on the rise in Australia. We need effective treatment and intervention options to reduce opioid-related harm. In October 2021, MARC made a submission to the Commonwealth Post-Market Review of Opiate Dependence Treatment Program (ODTP) Medicines. It recommends ensuring availability of a wide range of opiate dependence treatment medications, normalising opiate use disorder treatment in primary care, placing addiction specialists in all major hospitals, developing new models of service delivery, and subsidising dispensing and administration fees to make opiate dependence treatment more affordable for patients.

IT'S TIME TO DECRIMINALISE

Criminalisation of personal possession and use of drugs is one of the single greatest public policy failures in history. Not only has prohibition failed to eliminate the use of drugs – it has expanded drug markets and resulted in a more dangerous drug supply. Scarce police time and resources are wasted, increasing numbers of people are imprisoned at great expense, and diverse and marginalised communities including First Nations people are disproportionately impacted by laws that are historically rooted in racism and remain a structural enabler of it.

In March 2022, MARC published a position statement supporting the decriminalisation of the personal possession and use of small quantities of all prohibited drugs. It recommends removing criminal penalties and replacing them with education and treatment or administrative sanctions when needed, as Portugal has done. It also recommends expunging all historical convictions for non-violent offences relating to the personal possession and use of drugs, releasing all people currently incarcerated for these offences, and improving diversion programs to keep people out of the criminal justice system.

ALCOHOL BEVERAGES ADVERTISING CODE



Alcohol advertising has the potential to cause substantial harm and self-regulation by the alcohol industry has failed. In March 2022, on behalf of MARC, Professor Dan Lubman AM and Dr Tina Lam contributed to, and were signatories of, a statement on the alcohol industry's review of its Alcohol Beverages Advertising Code (ABAC) scheme. The statement argued the current ABAC scheme is inherently flawed and that the regulation of alcohol marketing in Australia should adhere to Government-led rules independent of the alcohol industry. To meet community standards and protect children, families, and communities, we need a comprehensive legislative framework with enforcement measures that effectively stop harmful alcohol advertising.

IT'S TIME TO DECRIMINALISE PERSONAL DRUG USE. HERE'S WHY – *MONASH LENS*

Professor Dan Lubman

The global 'War on Drugs' is one of the single-most catastrophic public policy failures in history. In 2022, Victorian MP Fiona Patten put forward a bill to decriminalise the personal possession and use of prohibited drugs. While the bill did not get the support from either side of government, Prof Dan Lubman says it did start an important conversation about how our drug laws are harming people, and how we can improve them.

"The whole point of prohibition was to reduce drug use and drug-related harms. Not only has it failed to do so, it's had the opposite effect."

Prohibition has expanded drug markets and created a more dangerous drug supply. Drug-related deaths increased 60% worldwide between 2000 and 2015. Illicit drugs now account for 1.3% of the global disease burden.

In Australia, law enforcement consumes between 61-69% of the total drug budget, and treatment only 20-23%. As a result, every year we arrest 80,000 Australians for drug use, while up to half a million can't access the treatment they need.

Prof Lubman says governments need to recalibrate their drug budgets so the lion's share of funding goes into treatment services, where it's an investment, and not law enforcement, where it's a sunken cost. They also need to listen to the health and law enforcement professionals who are calling on them to decriminalise the personal possession and use of prohibited drugs. [Read more](#)



PSYCHEDELIC RESEARCH RENAISSANCE: THE URGENT QUEST FOR NEW MENTAL HEALTH MEDICINES – *MONASH LENS*

In March this year, Australia's federal government committed \$15 million to explore a new frontier in mental health research – psychedelics, and their use in facilitating psychotherapy for common mental illnesses. A month before the landmark government funding announcement, the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System highlighted the severity of the mental health crisis, and the lack of new and effective medicinal treatments.

These milestones represent a seismic shift in both research potential and traditionally conservative thinking regarding the possibilities of compounds such as psilocybin (the psychoactive substance in "magic mushrooms") and MDMA (the active substance in some street "ecstasy"), the likes of which have remained prohibited – except for very limited research purposes – since the 1970s.

Monash University is embarking on cross-faculty psychedelic research, with the Clinical Psychedelic Research Lab, the first psychedelic medicine lab in Australia led by MARC member Dr Paul Liknaitzky, establishing several clinical studies.

One of these trials will investigate whether psilocybin-assisted psychotherapy can safely and effectively treat severe and entrenched anxiety; while another will look at a form of psychotherapy facilitated by MDMA – an "entactogen" rather than a classic psychedelic – in the treatment of severe PTSD.

Dr Liknaitzky's research group has also developed and delivered the first applied psychedelic therapist training in Australia, obtained the first industry funding and partnership for clinical psychedelic research, and has numerous local and international collaborations with leading experts in psychedelic science and treatment. CROWN RESORTS IS NOT TOO BIG TO FAIL. IT HAS FAILED ALREADY - *THE CONVERSATION*

The final report from The Royal Commission into the Casino Operator and Licence - an inquiry into the suitability of Crown Melbourne Limited to hold a casino licence was handed down in October 2021. The commission heard a litany of revelations about Crown's malfeasance and improper conduct across a range of areas. Royal commissioner Ray Finkelstein observed that everywhere he looked in the company there was evidence of inappropriate or unlawful behaviour.

Crown argued that it should keep running the casino, because cancelling or suspending its licence would not be in the public interest, asserting there are some 11,600 people who work for the casino and entertainment complex and Victoria's tourism industry would be endangered, should the licence be lost.

MARC member Associate Professor Charles Livingstone highlighted that the Melbourne casino contributed \$268 million in gambling taxes in 2018-19 and about \$30 million in payroll taxes, and while \$300 million a year in taxes and 11,600 jobs are significant, what is also significant is Crown's disproportionate contribution to the \$7 billion in annual costs attributable to gambling harm in Victoria.

Associate Professor Charles Livingstone says Crown is not and has never been a magic pudding, producing something from nothing. What it has done is transfer large sums to shareholders from many ordinary people (and a few, often criminally connected, high rollers), the consequences of which have been considerable in harm to gamblers and their families.
